This means that you might not be able to tell that somebody has a disability just by looking at them.

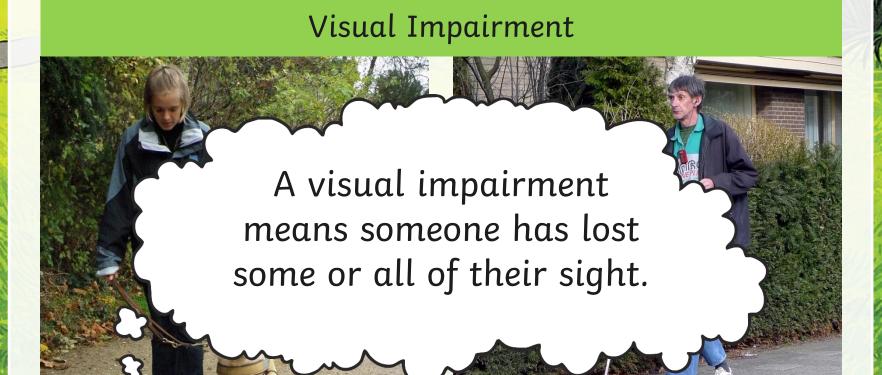

## Disability Awareness Day
