Use of Face Coverings on the school site	M	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> -From the 17th May 2021 Secondary age pupils no longer have to wear face coverings when in the classroom areas or moving about the building. -The school building is well ventilated for the entire period that it is occupied. -Pupils will continue to wear face coverings when accessing dedicated transport to and from school/college and when accessing dedicated transport during the school day. -Pupils aged 11 and over must still wear a face covering on public transport. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Due to the variants of COVID-19 - The current guidance continues to recommend in all schools that face coverings should be worn by staff and visitors outside of classrooms where social distancing is not possible (e.g. corridors). -In early years settings, it is still recommended that face coverings should be worn by staff and adults (including visitors) in situations where social distancing between adults is not possible. Children in early years settings should not wear face coverings. -Discuss with staff members if they wish to continue wearing face coverings in the classroom. -Discuss with Parents/Carers individual Pupil concerns. -The requirement to wear face coverings in the classroom could be re-introduced in the event of local outbreaks, including variants of concern. 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			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Ensure accurate class registers are maintained so you can easily identify who was out where and when on any given day. - Ensure all staff and pupils are in good health before undertaking the off-site visit. -Ensure class bubbles are maintained. Bubbles should have no more than 30 pupils. -Only teachers and current school workforce as part of an existing bubble should accompany the visit. Parents, carers, and volunteers should not accompany the group. -Bubbles should be formed from existing group and should have no more than 30 children. -The risk assessment should consider the integrity of the bubble and how this can be maintained throughout the visit, not mixing bubbles, contingency plans enabling a rapid response to someone developing symptoms and spending as much time as possible outdoors. -The risk assessment should reflect current public health restrictions in place and the residential provider should be able to demonstrate how they meet the requirements set out in the guidance on guest accommodation Hotels and other guest accommodation - Working safely during coronavirus (COVID-19) - Guidance - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk). -Travel plans are to reflect the system of controls particularly in relation to maintaining the integrity of the bubbles. 		
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			<p>-Secondary schools may wish to include LFD testing for Staff and Pupils if applicable before, and after the visit.</p> <p>-Schools are to check in advance that the provider has implemented effective control measures including where applicable for overnight sleeping arrangements and measures to ensure effective sanitisation of any shared facilities.</p> <p>-Consideration of the overnight sleeping arrangements and breaking the bubble down into smaller groups for sleeping and room sharing.</p> <p>-Ensuring appropriate insurance cover is in place. Schools are to ensure they have;</p> <p>- A COVID Kit for Educational Visits; Hand sanitiser, tissues, antiseptic wipes, bags for disposal of waste.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Medical - gloves and first aid items used to be double bagged and placed in waste bin. Ensure relevant PPE is available for staff to use. <p>-Where the activity is led by school staff ensure you have fully considered all risks relating to COVID-19 and the potential for infection during the planned activity and include how this will be managed. For example, if the activity is outdoors - regular handwashing/ sanitising; avoid touching objects shared by the public (e.g. a member of staff could hold a gate open to avoid everyone touching it); sanitising equipment before it is used; avoiding activities that require touching each other (e.g. holding hands).</p>
